Teaching Philosophy

Learning to paint isn't about learning formulas or special techniques but rather learning how to see. While there are many technical aspects of painting the most important part of an artists development is to see the truth of the painted subject.

As a teacher I have the privilege of assisting my students clarify and strengthen this knowledge and understanding. Sometimes this learning requires words and sometimes a visual demonstration. My greatest joy is seeing the spark ignite in my students when the connects are made and this is why I love to teach.

Learn About

Do you love watercolour paintings that have a beautiful colour arrangements and capture light so well? Do you want to learn how to make your watercolours glow with light and colour? If you are like me when I first started painting watercolour all I created was muddy colours and I always lost the light.

In this 2 day workshop, Leanne will guide you in learning to paint watercolours that capture light, feeling and you will have a better understanding on how to use colour to suit what you are painting. You will explore:

- understanding the light key
- value contrasts and how it affects mood
- colour and how it helps capture mood
- value and colour priority
- and LOTS more

The subject matter is open and you will be able to paint anything you like. The objective is to create at least one - two small 1/4 sheet watercolour paintings that glow with light and colour.









Basics:

I have selected a variety of images to explore different techniques and to try different watercolour approaches. The aim of this workshop is not to get you to paint like me but to learn to have fun with the watercolour medium.

Please ask questions as it helps everyone on their learning journey. If I say anything you don't understand please ask me to clarify.

Reference Photos:

You can bring your own reference material for this workshop but I will also be providing reference images closer to the date of the workshop for you to print out and bring along.

What to Bring

Paint:

I loath to provide you with an exact list of paint colours because the colours you have and I have on my palette are down to personal preference.

My palette consists of the following colours

- Hanasa Yellow Light (cool yellow)
- Cadmium Yellow Light (warm yellow)
- Cadmium Red (warm red)
- Carmine or Alizarin Crimson (cool red)
- Cobolt Blue (cool blue)
- French Ultramarine Blue (Warm blue)
- Raw Sienna or Quinacadone Gold
- White Gouache

I have many other beautiful colours. **Please do not go out and buy these colours**. They are not necessary for the workshop. I just wanted to include them here for your information. Additional colours include but not limited to

- Turquoise blue (optional)
- Opera Pink (optional)
- Moonglow (optional)
- Undersea green (optional)

It is always advisable to use the best quality paints you can afford. Student quality paints are good when you are learning but please note that they will not yield the exact same results as the artist quality.

Painting surface: 300gsm or higher watercolour paper is preferred but please use the best paper you can. (Rough or Cold Pressed).

Paper size: 1/4 sheet to 1/2 sheet and some small scrap sheets for experimenting

Bring lots of spare scrap paper for doing exercises

Easel: table top easel (limited easel options available)

Board: a board to stick your watercolour paper to.

Brushes: Round #10, and Liner Brush are essential. Other good quality watercolour brushes.

Other Stuff: Palette, palette knife (optional), rags or tissues, water container, small water spray bottle, masking tape, pencils, sketchbook, notebook and pen.

If possible bring little containers for putting watercolour in so you can also pour the colours on your paper.
